



Analysis of the Role of Zakat in Reducing Socioeconomic Inequality in Muslim Societies

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ABSTRACT

This study aims to analyze the role of zakat in reducing socioeconomic inequality in Muslim communities. Using a qualitative approach and secondary data analysis, this study explores the relationship between zakat management, social inequality (Gini index), and welfare improvement in several regions in Indonesia. The results show that larger zakat management, such as in Jakarta and Yogyakarta, contributes to a significant reduction in social inequality and a higher increase in welfare. In contrast, areas with smaller zakat management, such as Bandung, although showing an increase in welfare, still have relatively high social inequality. This study confirms that zakat can be an effective tool in reducing social inequality, but more efficient and transparent management is needed to maximize its impact. The results of this study provide recommendations for improving the zakat management system to be more efficient and inclusive.

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INTRODUCTION

Zakat has great potential to reduce economic inequality because its function is not only to provide assistance to those in need, but also to distribute wealth from those who are better off to those who are less fortunate.[6]. Through zakat, wealth redistribution can be done in a

fair manner and in accordance with Islamic principles. However, although zakat has great potential, in practice, there are still many challenges faced in the effective implementation of zakat, such as less transparent management, low public awareness, and less than optimal distribution.[7][8].

This study aims to analyze the role of zakat in reducing socio-economic inequality in Muslim communities, especially in Indonesia. With an analytical approach, this study will evaluate the effectiveness of zakat as an instrument to reduce poverty and improve community welfare, and identify factors that influence the management and distribution of zakat at the local level. METHODS.

1. Zakat Solution to Reduce Social Inequality

Zakat, as the main instrument in the Islamic economic system, has a very strategic role in reducing social inequality. As one of the pillars of Islam, zakat is not only required as a religious obligation, but also as a mechanism to create social balance in society. Zakat functions as a means of distributing wealth from the rich to the poor, which can ultimately reduce the gap between the two. In this case, zakat works not only in spiritual aspects, but also socially and economically, providing a real impact in improving the welfare of society.[9][10].

In principle, zakat fosters social awareness among Muslims to care for the socio-economic conditions around them. The challenges faced in zakat distribution are often related to ineffective administration problems, ignorance of the correct zakat mechanism, and the lack of active participation from the community in distributing zakat. and awareness among Muslims so that the role of zakat can be optimized in reducing social inequality.[15].

2. Research Stages

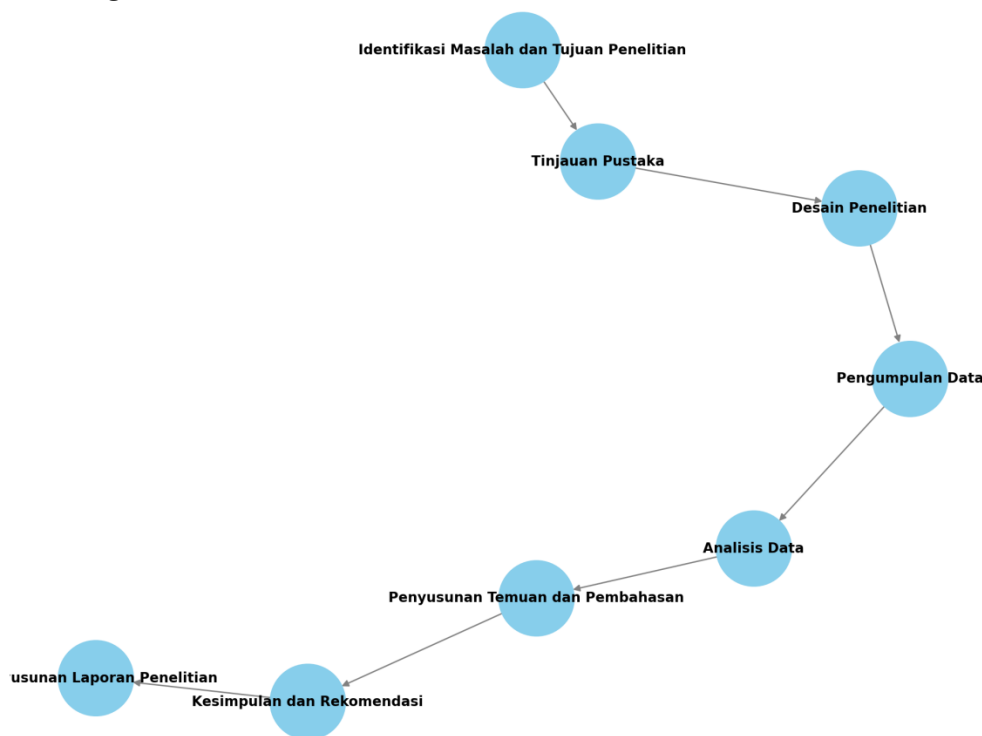


Figure 1 Research Stages

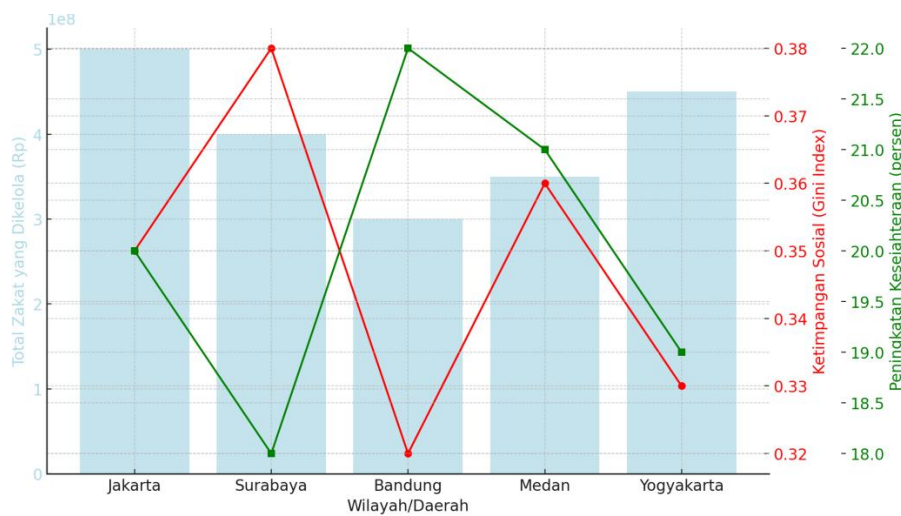


Figure 2 Analysis Chart

This graph shows the relationship between managed zakat, social inequality (Gini Index), and welfare improvement in five regions. The blue bar shows the amount of managed zakat, the red line shows the level of social inequality, and the green line shows the percentage of welfare improvement. In general, regions with greater zakat tend to show higher welfare improvements and lower social inequality.

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

The results of the analysis show that larger zakat management in areas such as Jakarta and Yogyakarta contributed to a more significant reduction in social inequality, with Gini indices of 0.35 and 0.33 respectively. The increase in community welfare in these areas was also recorded as higher, namely 20%-22%. In contrast, areas with smaller zakat management, such as Bandung, although experiencing an increase in welfare (22%), still have slightly higher social inequality (Gini index 0.32). This shows that although zakat can improve welfare, its effectiveness in reducing social inequality is highly dependent on the scale and management of zakat carried out.

This study confirms that zakat can reduce social inequality and improve the economic welfare of the community, especially in areas with efficient and transparent zakat management. However, although zakat managed in large amounts can have a more positive impact, factors such as the level of community participation in paying zakat, as well as the efficiency and transparency of zakat distribution, greatly affect the results achieved. In some

areas, such as Surabaya, although the amount of zakat managed is quite large, social inequality is still relatively high, which may be caused by problems in the uneven distribution of zakat or the lack of accessible zakat recipients.

The improvement in welfare recorded in these areas shows that zakat not only acts as a tool to reduce inequality, but also as a means of economic empowerment for zakat recipients. Areas with better zakat management, such as Jakarta, show more satisfactory results in terms of empowering poor communities. Therefore, to increase the effectiveness of zakat in reducing social inequality, a more transparent, efficient, and inclusive zakat management system is needed, which ensures that zakat distribution is right on target and covers more people in need.

Conclusion

This study successfully shows that zakat has a significant role in reducing social inequality and improving community welfare. Areas with greater zakat management, such as Jakarta and Yogyakarta, show better results in terms of reducing social inequality (with a lower Gini index) and improving community welfare. This suggests that zakat can be an effective tool for wealth redistribution, which in turn reduces social inequality. However, this analysis also identifies several challenges in zakat management, including low community participation in paying zakat, lack of transparency in management, and distribution problems that are not always on target. Therefore, more efficient and transparent zakat management is needed to maximize its positive impact. For further research, it is important to conduct a more in-depth analysis of the factors that influence zakat management, such as zakat policies, transparency of zakat institutions, and broader socio-economic impacts, including long-term economic empowerment for zakat recipients. Further research can also explore the role of technology in improving the zakat distribution system and increasing community participation. By considering these aspects, future research can provide more comprehensive recommendations to increase the effectiveness of zakat as an instrument for reducing social inequality.

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
